

B. Reading Comprehension

1. The Great British Bake Off

- The *Great British Bake Off* (GBBO) is a British television baking competition which chooses the best amateur baker in Britain. Over the course of ten hourly episodes, the series follows the highs and lows of 12 competitors, young and old, from every background and every corner of Britain. Each week one competitor has to leave and then in the final episode the best baker of Britain is crowned.
- In each episode, the amateur bakers are given three challenges: favourite bake, technical bake and show-stopper. The three challenges take place over two days and the competitors get marks from the judges. The favourite bake is a challenge where the bakers show off their favourite recipes for meals they might make for their friends or family. The technical bake tests technical knowledge to produce a certain product, such as pretzels. In the show-stopper challenge the judges look for the most impressive creations that taste fantastic.
- 2 Last year's winner was Candice Brown, a PE teacher from Bedfordshire. She grew up in the pubs her parents ran in London. She was always happy serving customers. It was her beloved granny who taught her to bake and Candice hopes that her cakes are as special as her grandma's. She now lives with her boyfriend Liam and her dog Dennis and loves baking best in her pyjamas.
- Candice Brown has been celebrating her victory and still can't believe she won. In her first tweet since the final, she wrote, "I am grateful, thankful and honoured! What a crazy few months! When they announced the winner, I couldn't believe my ears." Winning the competition has given her more confidence in life, she says.
- At first Candice went back to work, but now she has stopped teaching. She has decided to follow a career in baking. She has been offered some amazing opportunities, including writing her own cook book and being the star in her own TV baking show. She is also looking forward to opening her own tea shop, which GBBO fans can visit.
- The show has been amazingly successful in Britain. Since its start in 2010, it has become an important part of British culture. Interest in home baking has grown and the sales of baking ingredients, baking books and accessories have increased. In 2016, GBBO was the most-watched programme of the year, with 15.9 million viewers watching the final. There are now over 20 international versions of this baking show, for example in the USA, Germany and Australia.

Las Vegas is a city in the American state of Nevada, which is world-famous for its gambling, shopping, fine dining, entertainment, nightlife and neon lights.

1 Neon graveyard

Old casinos never die in Vegas and their neon signs are collected in the Neon Museum together with other objects from Las Vegas' history. Go on a walking tour past more than 150 signs around Fremont Street.

⁵ Pinball Museum

This is a fun place where rows of shiny pinball machines sit waiting for visitors to test their skills. The machines all belong to one man, Tim Arnold, a retired pinball machine dealer. He opened this pinball museum in 2009. There you can listen to the special sounds of the steel balls which bounce off bumpers or even try a game.

10 **Valley of Fire**

Around an hour's drive from Las Vegas is some of the most spectacular desert scenery in south-west America. The vivid red rock formations have doubled for alien worlds in films such as *Total Recall* and *Star Trek: Generations*. The Valley of Fire state park is open year-round for camping and hiking.

4 Hoover Dam

The Hoover Dam is only a short 30 minute drive from Vegas and one of the main tourist attractions in the area because of its great technology. It was the tallest dam in the world when it opened in the 1930s. The photo opportunities of the dam itself and Lake Mead are fantastic!

5 Colorado River rafting

You might think this sounds dangerous – but because the Hoover Dam controls the flow of the Colorado River, it is a very quiet and clear stretch. The trip is right for all ages and abilities, as there is little more to do than sit back and enjoy the scenery and wildlife. Keep an eye out for blue herons and desert bighorn sheep.




